It's how we know how old we are ... and when our birthdays are!







Last year, I went to the seaside. We need to know about time so that we can tell people about things that have already happened


... and so that we can plan things that are going to happen.



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
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Do you know what people use when they want to know the time?... Is it time to go to school?... Is it time to go to bed?

Here is a WATCH.






... and pointing.


Use your hands to point to a door.

point to your shoes.


point to a chair



You were good at pointing...
... and that's what the hands
on a clock or watch are for.
They point to the numbers
so that we can tell the time.




Join the dots to make the hands on these clocks and watches.



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
The hands of the clock move round. They point up to the 12... move round to point to 3... then 6... then 9... ... then back to 12. This is called moving CLOCKWISE.

Now cut out the clock hand, and move it 'clockwise' around the clock.



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Now we are going to begin thinking about what the hands on a clock tell us. They measure 'chunks' of time called



... HOURS ... MINUTES ... and SECONDS

Let's talk about SECONDS. Seconds are a very small 'chunk' of time.

Clap your hands.



That takes about a second.

Blink your eyes.



That takes about a second.

Say 'dog'



That takes about a second

Some clocks have an extra hand that measures seconds. That hand goes round very fast.

You can see it moving!

Find a clock or watch with a second hand and

watch it moving.

Now move your hand as fast as the second hand. Your teacher or



Numbers .. 1...4...5...8...9... and 12 take one second. The others take more than one second to do. Think of more things you do at home, or at school, that take one second to do...or more than a second!

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Because seconds are very small "chunks" of time... and because the second hand on the clock moves quickly, it is quite easy to time yourself... and other people... doing things for...



5 seconds or 10 seconds ... or even 30 seconds.


Now you know about SECONDS, let's think about a bigger 'chunk' of time called a MINUTE It takes 60 seconds for the second hand to go all the way round...

and 60 seconds make one MINUTE.

Try to remember that!
60 little seconds - all around the clock - make
ONE MINUTE



The hand on the clock that shows us how many minutes have passed is the BIG HAND. Colour in the minute hand on this clock and watch. Then find the minute hands on any clocks or watches in the room.



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How long does a MINUTE last?
Let's see! This little boy wants his
Mum to take him to the park, but she
has some jobs to doyet. You be Mum, and
pretend to do the jobs she is doing. Your teacher will
time you for ONE MINUTE.

Time yourself doing other things for one minute

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


Now you know how long a minute is! One SECOND is a very small 'chunk' of time... but one MINUTE is a bigger 'chunk' of time. Look at the pictures on the next page. Cut

them into individual pictures, then mix them up and put in a pile face down. Take one picture at a time ... decide how long it takes to do what the children are doing ... then put the picture in the correct box.

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The big minute hand goes round the clock more slowly than the second hand. You can't really see it moving - but it helps to know that everytime the minute hand has moved to the next number...



5 minutes has gone by.


Wait until the minute hand on your clock or watch is pointing to 12.

Then go away and do other things.

You might be painting or playing a game or watching T.V.


Every time your teacher or Mum tells you ... go back to the clock and see the number the BIG hand is pointing to.
How many minutes have gone by?

* The parent or teacher calls the child four or five times during an hour. The child can draw where the big hand is pointing on the clock faces. *

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


Did you watch the big hand go all the way round the clock? It takes 60 minutes for the bighand to go all the way round. That's a LOT of minutes to remember... So we call sixty minutes...

ONE HOUR.


ONE HOUR is a BIG 'chunk' of time. We can do a lot of work in an hour. We can play a lot of games in an hour.

The hand on the clock that shows us how many hours have gone by is the LITTLE hand. Colour the little hand on the clock and watch. Then find the hour hand ... the little hand... on any clocks or watches in the room.



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


Here is Jarved getting ready for bed.
I think it's going to take him one hour.
You know there are sixty minutes in one hour... so the big hand goes right found

the clock.. but the little hand moves slowly to the next number.


Jarved begins getting ready at 7 o'clock.

With your mum or teacher's help, guess how long it will take Jarved to do everything. Draw the big hand moving round the clock... and see the little hand move from 7 to 8.




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Here are more people doing things that take one hour. Talk about what they are doing... then make a picture plan of something you could do at school, or at home, that will take one hour?



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
So remember...

... seconds are small "chunks of time (Draw a small 'chunk' on Tick-Tock's hand). There are 60 seconds in a ...

.. MINUTE. A minute is a bigger "chunk of time. (Draw a bigger "chunk" on Tick-Tock's hand.)
There are 60 minutes in an....

... HOUR. This is a big "chunk of time. (Draw a big "chunk" on Tick-Tock's hand)

Make your hands move clockwise

Cut out the spider, the beetle, the snail and the tortoise. Make them 'walk' along the path in turns. Decide how long it will take them to 'walk' along the path.


Example: The spider will take 2 seconds.

The beetle will take 30 seconds


The snail will take one minute.

The tortoise will take two minutes



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
Now you know how the hands on a clock move, you can begin to tell the time. We use special words when we tell the time. Look at the clock.



The little hand tells us what HOUR it is. What number is the little hand pointing to? Find the big hand. This is the MINUTE hand. It's pointing straight up -


-to the 12 -so it hasn't started to measure the next sixty minutes yet. So, this clock tells us it is 3 o'clock



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Sometimes, we need to know how many minutes past the hour it is. For example, if we have to visit the dentist... or if we are meeting a friend.



Look at this clock. The little hand the hourhand - is pointing just past 8 ... and the big hand - the minute hand-has moved half way round the clock. So we say...

... half past eight.

Read the time on the clocks.

Use the words ... 'half-past'



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Here is a game for you to play:
On the next pages, you will find
two picture lotto sheets of a boy
and a girl doing different things at

different times during the day..... and two picture sheets of clocks showing different times.



Two people need to play this game. Choose a picture lotto sheet.

Squares. Mix them up, and place them face down on the table.

Take it in turns to turn over the $\stackrel{>}{=}$ the clock pictures.

Read the time on the clock, and see if it matches a time on your picture lotto sheet.

If it matches, cover the picture with the clock card if not, put the clock card to the bottom of the pile.
